SMOKE DETECTORS

Smoke detectors for homes and apartments are a must. A smoke alarm will let you know about a smoldering fire before it actually becomes a big fire.

The basic types of detectors are: the Photoelectric and the ionization. The Photoelectric responds to smoldering fires a few seconds quicker than the ionization detector. But, the differences are so small that it's more important to have any type than to spend the time trying to figure out which is the best.



Most detectors are battery operated. The 9 volt battery powered detector is the best. Some are 110 volt wired-in electric detectors. The battery type is the best in most cases because it can be mounted at the best spot by merely attaching it to the ceiling where you need it.

Where you place the unit is probably more important than the type of unit you select. Since smoke rises, the detector should be high. It is best placed on the ceiling and toward the center of the room. If for some reason you can't place a unit on the ceiling, it should go on the wall, but not right against the ceiling. Come down 6 to 12 inches from the top. The area where the ceiling and wall meet is a dead air space and the smoke and fumes would avoid that area in all probability. Be sure you're away at least a couple of feet from a corner. Corners are also dead air space and would be much longer in getting a whiff of smoke.

Do try to place the units close enough to sleeping quarters so that the alarm can be heard even with the bedroom doors closed. If there is any doubt about it being loud enough to wake you, install an additional alarm in the bedrooms.

Wired-in units can be installed in series so that if one detector senses smoke, all other units in the home go off.

If your home is two story, detectors should be installed on both floors. Your basement should also be equipped with a unit.

Each detector should be tested monthly. Smoke from a cigarette or a smoldering rope held near the detector will work the best.

So, what if you are awakened by the sound of the alarm in the middle of the night? Do you know what to do? You should have an escape plan for all the family. Have a fire drill and have a place outside for all members to congregate so you will be sure everyone is out. Then call for help at a neighbor's home.

Properly installed, smoke detectors can give you several minutes early warning which should be enough to save your life.

HEAT EMERGENCIES

Summer is fast approaching and with it comes heat and humidity. In warm weather there are three types of heat related emergencies which you may come accross. HEAT CRAMPS, HEAT EXHAUSTION and HEAT STROKE. Heat emergencies can affect anyone who is not used to exposure of extreme heat for any period of time.

HEAT CRAMPS is the least serious of the three. Cramps are muscular pains and spasms that occur when a person is sweating profusely and is losing too much salt out of the body. Heat cramps usually affects the arms, legs or abdomen and is a sign of a more serious emergency developing. The victim may feel faint, dizzy and exhausted.

EMERGENCY CARE: The victim should relax in a cool place and be given Gator-ade or salt water to drink. The salt water solution should consist of one teaspoon of salt in one-half glass of water every fifteen minutes until cramps cease. Consult your Doctor.

HEAT EXHAUSTION is the most common of all heat related emergencies. In hot environments or during physical exertion a person may sweat profusly, losing large quantities of salt and water from the body. The victim may complain of a headache, dizziness, nausea, weakness, possible faintness and profuse sweating.

EMERGENCY CARE: The victim should be taken to a cool place and remove as much clothing as possible. He should lay down with legs elevated. Apply cool wet compresses to the skin, a garden hose can also be used to cool the patient. Get patient to an emergency facility as soon as possible.

HEAT STROKE is the most serious. In heat stroke the bodies regulating mechanism break down causing cooling of the body to stop. This can cause internal temperatures to raise to 105 to 110 degrees with results of brain damage, permanent disability or even death. The patient may complain of a headache, dry mouth and muscle twitching. His skin may be dry, hot and red. The patient may lose consciousness or suffer mental confusion.

EMERGENCY CARE: Place patient in a cool place, lying down with legs elevated. Begin cooling with fans, applications of ice or with a garden hose. Remove as much clothing as possible. DO NOT give a heat stroke victim anything to drink. This is a life threatening situation, medical attention is crucial. The patient should be taken to the hospital as soon as possible.

CADET TROOP FORMED
